Dear brothers and sisters at St. Peter,

I feel that we should have a quiz!

I feel this way especially as we move into the Advent season. Last year, we enjoyed a sermon series during the Sundays of Advent that featured the candles on our Advent wreath. Do you remember what each of them stand for?

This is probably all the more important when we realize that we'll be using our Advent wreath again this year. Why use a tradition that you might not understand? So... what do those candles mean?

Down through time various interpretations have been suggested or added, even debated, but here are some classic meanings. The wreath is really a symbol of Jesus Christ.

If we start with the wreath itself, you'll notice that evergreen branches adorn it. The green color of these branches are "ever green," just like our Christmas trees in the forest. They symbolize the constant and eternal life that our Savior Jesus has, and which he has brought to us as well. Added to this is the fact that the wreath is in a circle, which has no beginning or end, symbolizing eternity. The wreath of branches is also a symbol of victory, so naturally we would think of the crown of life that Christ has won for us.

Each week an additional candle is lit. Jesus is the Light of the world, and he is approaching once again, both as we commemorate his birth and also at the end of time. The brightening light of the wreath reminds us that his coming is closer and closer as time marches on.

The color of most of the candles is blue. This color is symbolic of HOPE, the hope that we have as we await Christ's coming. It also is the color of the early morning sky as our Morning Star (a name of Christ) will come. And, he will take us to our final home in heaven, pictured in the blue color. In past times churches often used purple, the color of Lent, symbolic of repentance and the King of the Jews. Many have now changed to blue, since the repentance and mood of Advent is markedly different from the mood of Lent. In addition, it gives Advent its own unique and fitting color.

The first candle is the "Prophecy Candle." God revealed many details and made many promises through the Old Testament prophets, and we rejoice that he has faithfully kept them in the coming of our Savior.

#### *"Lessons from the Lessons" -*

During the Sundays of December we will be exploring how the readings from our Sunday Advent services fit together in a unified way to show the plan of God to send our Savior. Come and grow in your appreciation for how these readings have developed through the years!

### Wednesdays (6:30 pm)

(Replaced by our Wednesday evening Advent suppers and services)

The second candle is the "Bethlehem Candle." Was Bethlehem ready to receive the Savior? We are reminded to prepare our hearts through repentance and faith for the coming of our Savior.

The third candle is the "Shepherd's Candle." These first visitors had great joy as they heard about the newborn King, and worshiped him. The color for this third candle can be pink, for joy.

The fourth candle is the "Angels Candle." Hear the message they proclaimed that first Christmas night, and proclaim Christ's coming to those you meet and know.

The fifth candle (center) is the "Christ Candle." It is white, the color of purity for Christ's holiness. For Christmas morning and the Sundays after Christmas, it is the only candle lit in the wreath, for the waiting is over.

Scripture readings can easily be found to fit these foci for a meaningful Advent and Christmas devotional season.

So, share this message with your children or grandchildren. Remember this in our worship services. And use it in your own devotions at home.


## Voters' & Church Council Update—November 4 & 11

- The Early Childhood Ministry Committee presented their research and plans to the voters. A secret ballot was used to vote on the development of the ECM at St. Peter and the vote passed unanimously. It is the intent of the program to be self-sustaining, i.e., not require subsidy from the church budget, once the start-up costs have been paid. A special fund drive will run from Thanksgiving to New Year's, asking each member to prayerfully consider how they can support the ECM projects. This will allow the steering committee to plan and begin preparations.

- Pastor's Report: Pastor Schewe attended the Asian Ministry Conference in Wisconsin. WELS has 6 Hmong pastors, 3 Korean pastors, 1 Chinese pastor, 2 Vietnamese evangelists, among others, who currently serve in Home Missions.

Mornings with Mommy is considering adding a 3rd morning because of growing need.

- Elder's Report—There are no membership changes at this time.
- Trustee: Draft versions of the Lawn Care team schedule and the church and Luther Hall cleaning schedule were distributed. Please let Travis Hambleton know of any changes or if you're not on the schedule but would like to be.
- There will be a special Voters' Meeting on November 25th to review and approve the church budget for 2019. The next council meeting is scheduled for December 9th. Leo Schulz would like the congregation to know that they are invited to offer suggestions for issues that the council might address at future meetings.

## Hundreds Gather to Celebrate 125 Years of Apache Mission

Over 1,200 attended the Apache 125th anniversary celebration at Peridot Lutheran church and school, Peridot, Ariz., Oct. 26-28. The event commemorated the 125th anniversary of WELS World Missions work in the Apache reservations of Arizona.

Since its humble beginnings in 1893, the Apache ministry has grown, now serving over 3,600 people in a variety of ways. Five missionaries, two Apache pastors, and one Apache evangelist serve the nine congregations on the reservations. The Apache Christian Training School (ACTS) provides education and resources to prepare leaders for sharing God's Word on the reservations and beyond. Two schools serve over 275 students, giving them a foundational Christian education. These are just a few of the services for which attendees gave thanks at the celebration last month.


"The most encouraging thing about the work among the Apache people is that they are recognizing that the work of missions and ministry belongs to them," says Schroeder. "While we are still there to help and assist, it is gratifying that the Apache people are embracing the idea of training members of their tribe to serve as pastors and teachers, looking ahead to the day when all called workers on the reservation will be Apache."

## Holiday Fund Drive for St. Peter's Christian Pre-school

A cover letter and pledge forms have been put in all our member's mailboxes to indicate a gift that you might like to give by year's end and/or a monthly gift in 2019. Please prayerfully consider how you can generously support this new ministry at our church. This will greatly assist our church in reaching out with the gospel to both children aged 3-4 and their families.



It would really be a blessing to have this amount covered in gifts and pledges for 2019 by the end of the Holiday Fund Drive, so that work can be planned for the new year. Together, we are able to do this!

Note that when you submit your pledge form, you do not need to give monies with it at that time. The form simply indicates your intentions for a gift by Dec. 31 and/or monthly in the new year. Forms can be either put in the offering or placed in Norm VanderPoel's mailbox.

You can choose whether or not to include your name on the pledge form. Those who do so will receive a report from the church for tax purposes. Whether you include your name or not will not matter as far as confidentiality, as all forms will be kept by Norm VanderPoel, our financial secretary. Forms will not be viewed or circulated by others.

When you are ready to give the gift(s) that you have decided on (in December and/or monthly in 2019), please make sure it is clearly marked as your gift to "St. Peter ECM." A new checking account has been opened for those funds and will be kept separate from our church operating funds.

Please consider your gift to be above your regular church offerings, as our normal ministries and obligations do need to continue at St. Peter.
