The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 1. During this sacred season, we recount the accounts of Jesus' suffering and death, a solemn time of worship as we realize what our sin has cost him. Yet it is also a time of inner joy, as we thankfully praise the Lord for his salvation.

### What's next?

I've had a chance to think about that for over a year. It seems like just a couple months ago that I was on the phone with Travis regularly, arranging details for our family's move to Clovis. But, it's been over a year since we arrived. Where does the time go? We are so thankful for the support and friendship that everyone here at St. Peter's has extended to us.

In the last year, not only has my family gotten settled in the area, but our church has also been greatly blessed by the Lord. He has "settled" us, strengthened our stakes, and given us a spirit of unity in our faith, fellowship, and friendship.

So, what's next? I ask the question in the context of our church's ministries. After all, we are not here just for "ourselves." God has given us a mission to reach out with the gospel and share our Savior with those around us in our community and our own neighborhoods.

Of course a church should plan the "regular" things that a church does: Sunday worship, Bible classes, Catechism instruction, Sunday School, fellowship meals and events, and more. Yet as I've had an opportunity to reflect on certain aspects of St. Peter's objectively, I've thought of a few things that I believe are worth doing and trying to enhance our ministry opportunities and meet more people here in Clovis. Because I've been blessed to serve at three churches over the last 24 years and also serve our Wisconsin Synod as a consultant for the Commission on Congregational Counseling (CCC), I've had a chance to see a number of different churches' ministries in action as they reach out with the gospel.

I shared some thoughts with our Church Council and at the Voters Meeting, and I'd like to share them with our church at large as well for your thoughts, prayers, input, and (if you'd like) your help.

One of the foremost things in my mind is that I believe we should consider offering some type of children's ministries during the week that we can invite people to. There are over 200 new movers within a 3-mile radius of our church property every month. (Read that again, if you need to!) Many of these new movers are families. Many of them have children that we can invite in some way and get to know.

We also have a terrific facility in Luther Hall with a large space, five classrooms, full kitchen and bathrooms. We don't need to hassle with rented or temporary space. We are on a very visible intersection for publicity. And, Luther Hall is available to use most of the week!

One of the ways our WELS congregations does children's ministry is by offering a meeting time for young mothers and their young children during the week. It affords a chance for children's activities—story time, Bible time, music time, play time—and also social time for the young moms (or grandparents or dads) that bring the kids. Offered once a week or twice a month, it doesn't involve a great deal of cost.

If the Lord opens doors in this area, eventually I believe it would be wise for our church to consider opening an *Early Childhood Ministry (ECM)* at our church. This is the new wave of outreach via education in our synod. An ECM can offer 3-year old, 4-year old, and/or 5-year old preschool classes by half or full days during the week. ECM's are tuition based and don't carry the cost burden that a grade school does for a congregation. And again, we have a great facility to start that conversation with.

Our synod now has 403 ECM's, compared to 313 grade schools. Martin Luther College, our college of ministry, has a training program specifically for ECM teachers that is separate from its grade school program, even operating an ECM of its own on their campus for hands-on training purposes for college students in that track.

The spiritual aspect could also be attractive to many in our conservative community. Bible stories, hymn singing, chapel by the pastor, and even singing for Sunday services could be offered. It would only take a regular group in the teens to have a viable program.

All that, of course, would be down the road, if the Lord leads in that direction. For now, I believe discussing some occasional weekday children's ministries would be wise. Please pray that God would keep our mission in front of us, and use us and our congregation to reach out and meet those around us in our corner of the world, and to share the Savior with them as we have opportunity!

### New Luther Movie with Reformation 500

In celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, a new Luther movie has been produced. This film explores the life of Martin Luther and his quest for truth, bringing to life the key events of the Reformation. "It explores the truths of the Reformation: Christ at the center of our faith, the importance of God's undeserved grace, and the value of Scripture as the authority for all teaching in the Christian church," says Rev. John Braun, chairman of the Reformation 500 committee and author of a new book called *Luther's Protest*. Watch for more information, and plan on seeing it!

## **Bible Translation Update—Holman Christian Standard Bible**

A revised version of the Holman Christian Standard Bible (HCSB) is now available and has been influenced by input from WELS pastors. This is one of three translations WELS considered adopting for use in publishing in 2013. The other two are NIV2011 and the ESV. The 2013 synod in convention chose not to adopt a single translation for WELS publications.

The WELS Translation Liaison Committee (TLC) discovered HCSB publishers would welcome input from WELS on revisions, and submitted 56 pages of recommendations dealing with issues not limited to one passage or context and 1,031 recommendations on individual passages.

Three members of the WELS TLC met with the publishers of the HCSB for five hours to discuss the suggested recommendations. All of the recommendations of the TLC have been incorporated in the revised text and a high percentage of our recommendations on individual passages." The WELS Conference of Presidents appointed a committee of five pastors to review the CSB. That group is planning a comprehensive review of the revised text that will involve a large number of WELS pastors. Stay tuned for more details.

When the print version is released in March, Northwestern Publishing House will begin offering the CSB for purchase.
