

Dear brothers and sisters at St. Peter,

*How blest are they who trust in Christ
When we and those we love must part.
We yield them up, for go we must,
But do not lose them from our heart.*

So wrote Fred Pratt Green in his hymn that we include in the "Death and Burial" section of our hymnal.

I thought of those words often during the past two weeks, as I took an unexpected trip to the Midwest to be with my mother. She suffered a severe heart attack that put her in the ICU for 8 days before the Lord took her home to himself in heaven.

I was able to be with her in her hospital room during the last 4 days. She was not conscious, but was possibly able to hear us. As time went on, hope faded that she would be making a recovery. Systems were shutting down, treatments were not changing her situation much, and the aggressive medications were having adverse effects on her body in other ways.

I thought of the words of the hymn verse above.

I didn't want to say good-bye to my mom on this side of heaven. She had been with me all along, of course. She raised us three children in the Lord's ways and took care of all our physical needs at home. She went to countless sporting events, recitals, concerts, and plays during our grade school, high school, and college years. And she didn't do it because it was top notch entertainment! She was our biggest fan and supporter.

She was the one who dropped me off at Northwestern College as I began my path of studying for the ministry. And the cards she sent me at Christmas, birthdays, Valentine's Day, and other occasions always were full of encouragement that the Lord was leading me along, and carrying out his plan in my life.

But now the Lord was calling her home. It was clear. Her damaged heart and body simply could not overcome what had happened. *"We yield them up, for go we must, but do not lose them from our heart."*

My mom was blessed with 79 years of life in this world, an active life of walking, traveling, and living at home with my

dad. And although we as Christians know that we are all day-to-day, I had hoped that we would have her with our family for more years, perhaps even 90, as her sister Helen had lived to be.



But it was not to be. The day she died was sad and reflective, but it was not without peace, hope, and comfort. She knew her Lord so well. She knew each day with her children and grandchildren was a blessing from God's hand. And she was ready anytime he might call her out of this world. She had even said that many times!

So we yield her up. It was not easy. In fact, it was terribly difficult. But we know that we will see her again at our Savior's side, and in a perfect place that Jesus has won for us and promised to take us to. We will be reunited and we will praise his name forever for his grace and goodness to us.

I pray that as the Lord leads your family through days when you must "yield up" your loved ones, you would have such comfort too. And I pray God leads you to thank him for the days he granted, and accept that he does all things well and in his time. What a blessing!

February Council Meeting Update (2/11/18)

- At the direction of the council, Travis Hambleton has been working with the City of Clovis on a Site Plan Amendment to allow us to landscape the south and east sides of the property if we wish. The cost of the permit is \$775.
- The church council has decided that the offering from the Lenten mid-week services will go to tuition support for Emily & Rachel Schewe as they are studying to become called workers.
- Outreach: An Outreach committee met to discuss Early Childhood Ministry options for our church. They have completed part 1 of 5 from the WELS Planning Binder. They will continue with their discussions.
- Trustee Report: Sierra View Nursery returned to work on the Luther Hall gardens and some of the church building gardens. The next church work day is Saturday, March 24th.
- Fresno Parkinson's Support Group is considering using Luther Hall to hold their monthly meetings. There are some insurance issues to resolve but they hope to begin meeting soon.
- The council has decided to bring the issue of the pew fund to the voters. At the April voters' meeting, the voters will be asked to decide whether the pew fund should continue in its current state, or be released into the general fund/special projects in accordance with the wishes of the people who donated to the pew fund.
- Elder's Report: Robert English and Anncy English have been accepted into membership by adult confirmation and adult baptism (Anncy). The elders are looking into getting a retired pastor to lead the worship service on March 11th when Pastor Schewe is visiting his children at Luther Prep.
- Next council meeting is scheduled for March 11. Don Sweetman would like the congregation to know that they are invited to offer suggestions for issues that the council might address at future meetings.


New WELS Catechism and Personal Bible Study

You may not be aware that our synod, as a part of our celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation, has recently produced a revision of Martin Luther's Small Catechism. The revision is not a revision of the chief parts of the catechism or Luther's familiar answers to the question, "What does this mean?" What have been revised are the detailed questions and answers that expand on what Luther wrote.

Luther often encouraged faithful Christians to study and review the catechism as a part of their daily devotional lives. With that in mind, the newly revised WELS catechism is formatted in such a way to encourage our members to use the catechism on a daily basis, long after they have been confirmed. As in the previous version of the catechism, Scripture passages are included to provide the clear biblical basis for the doctrines we believe, and a continuing review of those teachings is always helpful in strengthening faith and increasing our knowledge of what the Bible teaches.

But in addition to those passages, the new catechism has been designed to flow for a more natural read. Each section begins with an introduction and transitional thoughts and concludes with a "Connections" section that provides application and could also serve as the basis for personal or family devotions. The new catechism provides additional guidance through Bible history narratives. It also features illustrations, thought questions, and applications of biblical truths in a way that makes it a practical and easy-to-use tool for continuing study of God's Word.

The catechism is not just for kids. Consider getting a copy for your own devotional use. Copies are available for purchase from Northwestern Publishing House at nph.net/catechism.


Daylight Saving Time Begins
