Lent Begins in March



Dear brothers and sisters at St. Peter,

Ashes on Ash Wednesday?

Our hymnal's Occasional Services includes a rite for the Imposition of Ashes with these comments:

"Ash Wednesday begins the Christian's Lenten journey with a reminder of our mortality and a call to repentance. The ancient practice of imposing ashes on the foreheads of the faithful gives Ash Wednesday its name.

The church father Tertullian (ca. A.D. 165-215) writes of the practice as a public expression of repentance and of our human frailty that stands in need of Christ. The ashes remind us forcefully of our need for redeeming grace as they recall words from the rite for Christian burial: '...earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust...,' words that will someday be spoken over us all."

In the Scriptures, we hear of the mention of ashes connected with repentance with people such as Job (42:6), Ezekiel (27:30), Jeremiah 6:26), Daniel 9:3), and Mordecai (Esther 4:1).

Jesus encouraged the practice in Matthew 11:21.

The Imposition of Ashes is a form of symbolic communication, similar to the use of an Advent wreath, kneeling for communion, or bowing your head during prayer. For those who understand the symbolism, it can be a meaningful custom.

We hear comforting words about God's response to those who repent: "He raises the poor from the dust and lifts the needy from the ash heap; he seats them with princes and has them inherit a throne of honor." (1 Samuel 2:8)

The custom of reintroducing the ashes to Ash Wednesday began in the 1950's in the liturgical movement as churches sought to reclaim many of Christianity's ancient and pure

traditions. Many of our WELS churches offer the imposition of ashes each year.

We will offer ashes at the end of the Ash Wednesday service for <u>only those who would like to come forward</u> <u>and receive them</u>. It will be completely voluntary. After some introductory words, those who would like to receive them will be invited forward.

Ashes are normally applied to the forehead in the shape of the cross with the minister's words: "Dust you are, and to dust you shall return."



Those who prefer the ashes on their hand are welcome to extend their hand, palm down.



If you have any questions about the practice, please talk to me. If you're unsure of whether you'd like to participate, I'd encourage you to give it a try. It could be a meaningful start to your Lenten walk.

ECM Action Team Update

The new ECM Action Team has been meeting regularly since December. This new committee for 2019 has been tasked with carrying out the work laid out in the report to the congregation at the Open Forum and fall Voters Meeting, which is necessary for our church to open a Christian pre-school by August 2020.

The past weeks has been filled with discussion, securing more bids where prices might be lower than anticipated, filling out paperwork and applications, and permitting.

- During our Holiday Fund Drive, about \$66,000 in gifts and pledges were made toward the new pre-school. Praise God for this! May God move our members to follow through on these pledges for 2019.
- A fire alarm (required) is presently being designed and permitted.
- The modifications to Luther Hall are almost ready to submit to the Clovis building department for permitting.
- The playground fence, layout, and materials have garnered much discussion on the committee. Plans are to begin work on this in spring before the weather gets hot.

The target for completing the onsite preparations is around October. There will be opportunities for our members to help with various tasks once the work begins, to keep our costs at a minimum. Look for these opportunities and volunteer if you have skills in a certain area!

Please continue to keep this new ministry in your prayers, that God would bless our discussions and plans, and continue to open doors for us. Offerings toward this in 2019 should have checks made out to "St. Peter Lutheran ECM" and be clearly marked.

Prayers for our WELS mission in Haiti

Note from Lee Petersen on February 13, 2019:

Dear Friends of Branch Lutheran Schools of Haiti, Inc.,

The political unrest in Haiti, which has been ongoing for months, has intensified in recent days. The unrest is driven by "a worsening economic crisis that has led to a drop in living standards, inflation at around 15 per cent, a growing national deficit, and allegations of corruption leveled at President Jovenel Moise, before he took office." according to the UN News.

Branch Schools is not immune during these challenging times. Pastor Terry Schultz, WELS missionary to Haiti, summarizes reports from the school directors: "The continued turmoil in Haiti has led to many businesses and markets closing for days on end. Our schools may be closed for the entire week. Meanwhile, prices on basic food supplies have skyrocketed between 30% to 100%. Huge increases are also reported in drinking water, charcoal, and cooking oil. At least one of the 3 orphanages (Boursiquot's) is down to one meal and one snack per day."

HAITI UPDATE: February 20, 2019 (Lee Peterson): Thank you for your continued prayers and support of our brothers and sisters in Haiti. We're so grateful for friends like you who are holding the children close in prayer during this time of hardship. The outpouring of concern during this crisis is truly humbling. We're receiving messages of encouragement from across the country. More than \$8,000 has been donated for food needs in Haiti so far.

Last week, we immediately sent money through secure means to the Branch Lutheran Schools of Haiti, Inc. directors and we confirmed with them that the money was received and used to purchase food and cooking supplies. We are thankful for safe and modern means of transferring money across the world. We will continue to send your generous contributions to Haiti throughout the coming weeks and months as we do not foresee a decrease in food prices in the near term. Many news outlets are reporting Haiti is close to a humanitarian crisis. Two of the schools opened today after being closed for over a week. However, the situation remains perilous. The government opposition has established a 72-hour deadline for the government to resign or riots, unrest, and violence will resume.
