## St. Peter Early Childhood Ministry (ECM) Update— Voters Approve Revised Budget

A special Voters Meeting was held on June 23 to discuss the budget for start-up costs for our Early Childhood Ministry (ECM). Some circumstances have caused the \$64,000 budget approved by the congregation last October to rise:

- The city of Clovis has required us to engage an architect for the interior renovations on Luther Hall. This required work has included seismic studies and foundational studies, official drawings, and more.
- We also have been required to have a contractor do this work. It had been hoped that we would be able to do these minor renovations, but that is not the case.

- Due to official permitting required, some ADA updates have also been required, such as a different water fountain and some other minor items.
- Some concrete work in the new playground area to add a patio and a driving track for toys has been contracted out instead of done in house.

These costs have resulted in the budget being raised to \$105,000. Total contributions toward the ECM start-up costs as of last month totaled \$85,000, and pledges are still being received from the Holiday Fund Drive until the end of the calendar year.

The voters discussed and approved the revised budget. If you have any questions about this or would like to receive the revised paperwork, talk to Pastor Schewe, Leo Schulz (church president), or Travis Hambleton (ECM Action Team chairman).

May God continue to bless our plans to open a Christian pre-school in August 2020!

Part of these worship laws included the structure, furnishings, and activity that involved the tabernacle, the tent which was the center of their worship life. These laws were given in great detail.

Why is this a relevant question this month? We will be enjoying a summer sermon series on the parts of the tabernacle. Much can be learned about God's plan of salvation, our faith, and our Christian lives from the tabernacle and the regulations that God gave his people.

The ceremonial laws of Moses were clearly given by God for that time period of history. Colossians 2 tells us: "Do not let anyone judge you by what you eat or drink, or with regard to a religious festival, a New Moon celebration or a Sabbath day. These are a shadow of the things that were to come; the reality, however, is found in Christ."

#### "Grand Words and Key Themes!"



## Assignment of WLS Graduates Reduces Vacancies

On May 23 the synod's Assignment Committee met at Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary, Mequon, Wis., to assign vicars and graduates. Sixty requests came to the Assignment Committee (77 last year, 57 the year before). There were 30 candidates available (34 last year, 33 the year before). All candidates were assigned; 30 of those calls were unfilled (43 last year, 24 the year before). Of those 30 candidates, 26 were seniors receiving their first call and four were from previous classes. In addition, three were reassigned to one-year calls, and three had previous temporary assignments made permanent. Several candidates were assigned to new mission starts or restarts. After the Assignment Committee did its work, there were still 104 vacancies for pastor-trained men synodwide. About 90 of those vacancies were for parish pastors.

Congregation Mission Offerings update: Congregation Mission Offerings (CMO) receipts for May of \$1,826,000 represent an increase of \$204,000 (12.5%) over 2018. Through May, receipts are up \$153,000 (2.0%) over 2018 and are 3.3% ahead of projections for the first five months. Michigan, South Atlantic, and Western Wisconsin districts are significantly ahead of projected receipts for the first five months. This is very good news, and we can be thankful to God for moving his people to provide these offerings of thanks for the support of the work we do together as a synod.

District meetings: Most districts are holding meetings this month in a variety of formats. Some of these meetings are intended to prepare delegates for the synod convention in July; others are focusing on continuing education for called workers. The synod convention will be held July 29 through Aug. 1 at Martin Luther College, New Ulm, Minn. Learn more about the synod convention at wels.net/2019synodconvention.

## Christian Preschool (ECM) Update

Our ECM Action Team has been meeting monthly to discuss and make plans for our work in opening a Christian preschool by August 2020. Some updates:.

- Our Fund Drive has brought in about \$ 65,000 of offerings. Please continue to support this effort as you fulfil your pledges and make contributions. With the original \$20,000 that had been given toward this new ministry originally, the ECM account has \$ 85,000 total in it. Praise our gracious God!
- The fire alarm (required) for Luther Hall has been installed.
- The architect plans (required) for the building modifications have been submitted and approved by the city of Clovis. A contractor is being chosen to oversee the work of putting in the new wall and fire egress, and work on this is planned to be finished by mid-summer.
- The playground area has been prepared, concrete areas poured, and the grass planted. A play structure will be ordered this summer. After that, the fence will be installed.

The target for completing the onsite preparations is around October. There will be opportunities for our members to help with various tasks once the work begins, to keep our costs at a minimum. Look for these opportunities and volunteer if you have skills in a certain area!

Please continue to keep this new ministry in your prayers, that God would bless our discussions and plans, and continue to open doors for us. Offerings toward this in 2019 should have checks made out to "St. Peter Lutheran ECM" and be clearly marked.
