Dear brothers and sisters at St. Peter,

With the numerous themes, background, and contexts of the various books of the Bible, it can be difficult for casual readers or even longtime church members to remember the details of each book.

In this and succeeding issues of our newsletter you'll see articles on each category of Scripture's books and how they fit into God's plan of salvation. May God bless this series! This month, we begin with a look at what the inspired Scriptures are overall:

The Bible, the Holy Scriptures. What an amazing book!

More than 10,000 handwritten copies of the Bible have come down to us from ancient times, thousands more than any other book. Since the invention of the printing press, it has topped the best seller list year after year, century after century. It's estimated that nearly four billion Bibles have been published in the last 175 years. The entire Bible or parts of it have been translated into 2000 languages.

President Abraham Lincoln called it "the best gift God has ever given to man." The reformer Martin Luther wrote, "Let the man who would hear God speak read Holy Scripture." Indeed, the Bible is the very word of God. From beginning to end, the Bible states that it is God's word. The expression "thus saith the Lord" or its equivalent occurs well over 2000 times in the Bible.

Jesus often equated the Scriptures with God's word. Referring to an Old Testament text, for instance, he declared, "Have you not read what God said to you..." (Matthew 22:31). And he told his disciples, "The Holy Spirit ... will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you" for the writing of the New Testament (John 14:26).

The Bible also proves its divine power in our hearts. It contains the good news of Christ, the gospel, which is "the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes" (Romans 1:16).

The word "bible" comes from a Greek word meaning "the book." Actually, the Bible is a collection of 66 separate books—29 in the Old Testament written before the coming

of Christ, and 27 in the New Testament. Over a period of 15 centuries—from about 1400 BC to AD 100—some 40 different men wrote the various books. Yet behind it was the almighty God, inspiring them, breathing into them the exact words to write. "All Scripture is God-breathed" (2 Timothy 3:16).

Since the Bible is God's own book, it is perfect. "The Scripture cannot be broken," said Jesus (John 10:35). Time after time, Scripture has been challenged. In 1806, for instance, the French



Institute counted 80 geological theories which were hostile to the Bible. Not one of those theories now stands. Whether speaking of nature, history, or theology, the Bible is without error. Yet each new generation of skeptics continues to level its attacks against the word. Then they fade and pass away like grass and like the flowers of the field. "The grass withers and the flower fall, but the word of our God stands forever" (Isaiah 40:8).

Because it is God's word, the Bible is our highest authority. Throughout the centuries, believers have echoed the words of early Christians, "We must obey God rather than men!" (Acts 5:29). No earthly authority stands above God's word.

The master author begins the Bible by recounting his creation of heaven and earth. Then he describes the first man and woman's life in paradise. The third chapter of Genesis brings us to the dreadful history of the fall into sin. Adam and Eve gave in to the devil's temptation, and thus brought sin and death upon the entire human race. Yet immediately after this tragic history, we read the first promise of the Savior, the one who would "crush" the devil's power (Gen. 3:15).

There, early in the Bible's first book, the pattern is set for the entire Scriptures. It is the story of people's sin and God's grace. Like a dark thread, the story of sin runs through the Bible. But alongside it runs the golden thread of the promise of the Savior in the Old Testament and the fulfillment of that promise in the New.

Saint John sums up the purpose of his Gospel, as well as the rest of the Bible: "These are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). Everything in the Bible centers around Jesus.

Church Council & Voters' Meeting Update (7/14/19 and 7/28/19)

- Pastor's Report: Pastor will be on vacation August 18th. A new catechism class is being organized and will begin in Fall 2019.
- ECM Governing Committee has had 2 initial meetings. The members are Jeff Hansen, John & Teresa Barber, Mike & Leslie Fitzgerald, and Vicki Schewe. ECM Governing Committee was recommended for addition to the church bylaws by the council and was approved by the voters. This establishes the church council as the "board of control" for the State of California in regard to the ECM.
- ECM Action Committee is working on the construction project and finishing designs for the playground. They will present more information at the August 4th Open Forum.
- Catherine Hambleton has indicated she would like to retire from the church secretary position. The Church Council will be finding a replacement in the next few weeks.
- Trustee Report: Next campus clean up day will be Saturday, September 7th. The Church Council is investigating solar options to help reduce our power bills now and in the future when we have our ECM up and running.
- Evangelism Committee: Continuing outreach to people who have just moved into the area. They will be forming a committee to create a live nativity this year. We will be asking some MLC students to come help with outreach this summer. We will also continue with the farmer's market in Clovis—volunteers are still needed.

The Scriptures, says Jesus, "Testify about me" (John 5:39). He is the long-awaited Savior who has died for the sins of the world and rose again for our salvation. The purpose of the Bible is to make us "wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus" (2 Timothy 3:15). Without Christ the Bible would be empty. With him, it is the door to heaven. Moreover, the Bible shows us how to lead a godly life while we still live on earth response to Christ's love for us.

As the Savior's book, the Bible is sufficient. In telling us about Jesus, it contains everything we need to know for our salvation. The holy writers make it clear that we are not to look for another gospel or for further divine revelations. "But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach a gospel other than the one we preached to you," Paul says, "let him be eternally condemned!" (Galatians 1:8). The Bible's last book warns against adding to or subtracting from it (Revelation 22:18,19) - a warning that applies to all of God's word. Religions such as Islam and Mormonism add new revelations. They preach another "gospel" and stand eternally condemned. The Bible alone brings to us the only Savior. It is his book.

The Bible is also our book. The apostle Paul asserts, "Everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through endurance and the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope" (Romans 15:4). Since God wants to teach us, ought we not want to learn? Sadly, we all too often neglect the word of God. "more Bibles are bought and fewer read than any other book," laments one Christian author. But he goes on to say, "If you see a Bible that is falling apart, it probably belongs to someone who isn't." God did not give us the Bible to gather dust on the coffee table. It's ours to use and wear out. It's our that we might grow in knowledge, strength, and faith.

Finally, the Bible is also ours to share. There is absolutely no greater fit that we can pass on to the next generation. There's no greater gift to share with our dying world today.
