Dear brothers and sisters at St. Peter,

How's the COMPANIONSHIP in your marriage?

In our upcoming newsletters, I'd like to share some relevant thoughts on aspects of marriage. This article by Pastor Bruce McKenney has some thought-provoking material:

"Jim had called to set up a meeting. He and his wife were having some problems in their marriage. He said, 'I can't put my finger on it, Pastor, but it just seems like we're drifting apart.'

We tried to set up a time to meet, but we couldn't find a time when they could get together. The more we tried, the more obvious it became as to what one of their problems was—they never seemed to be together.

One of the main purposes of marriage is companionship. God saw the need. 'It is not good for the man to be alone' (Genesis 2:18). So he created a companion, the woman. He then brought her to the man and established marriage in which man and woman could enjoy a lifelong companionship as husband and wife.

Next to the personal relationship with the Lord, the companionship between husband and wife is to be the most important. Children, parents, siblings, friends, and coworkers are all important relationships that we need in life, but none of them are to take precedent over the time and effort husbands and wives should invest in their relationship with one another. Couples get married to be together. So it makes sense that they should strive to spend as much time together as possible.

Why? God wants to bring blessings to husbands and wives through that companionship in marriage and then to the entire family as well. In marriage God provides a marvelous way in which the physical and emotional needs of husband and wife can be met. In marriage God provides companionship for couples in which the joys of life can be doubled and the sorrows halved.

There were other issues in Jim's marriage. But one of the main issues was that he and his wife weren't spending any time together. It's not the first couple that had that problem. It all started in the Garden of Eden when sin not only separated mankind from God but also husband and wife from each other.

That is still the devil's plan today. If the devil can get couples so busy with work, family, and social schedules that they aren't

spending enough time together, communication can break down, trust can be eroded, and the couple that got married to be together start feeling like they're all alone. Perhaps Jim and his wife seemed to be drifting apart because they were apart.

So what's the solution? Remember what God's Word teaches about marriage. The foundation of marriage is a lifelong commitment between one man and one woman. But also remember that one of the purposes and blessings of marriage is companionship. Like they do before marriage, couples should make sure they are spending the time they need to be together to keep their companionship as strong and loving as possible.

Inviting the Lord to be a part of that companionship is even more important! Besides enjoying a cup of coffee together or going out for a romantic dinner, it can be as simple as going to church and Bible class together or setting aside a little time each day for prayer and Bible reading."

May God move all our married couples to see the importance of such companionship!

Prayers for Christian Cortright

Prayers for 3 year old Christian Cortright who had brain surgery on July 24th to remove a brain tumor. Christian is the young son of Pastor Ryan and Sarah Cortright from Our Redeemer Lutheran Church; Madison, WI. Christian has an epidermoid brain tumor, which he's had since birth. The tumor is situated between his optical nerves and touching his pituitary gland. Due to complications from the tumor, Christian has had repeated bouts with meningitis starting when he was only 9 months old. The surgery lasted about 6 hours. Prayers for Christian and his entire family. Also a belated happy birthday to Christian who had his 3rd birthday on July 20th.

After his surgery in July, his parents posted the following note:

"Christian is out of surgery and recovering in the Pediatric ICU. Dr. Baskaya said that once they got in there they found that the cyst had recently ruptured which caused his most recent bout of chemical meningitis. He was able to remove most of the cyst capsule from the very sensitive optic nerves and arteries. Please pray that the small portions of the cyst capsule that remain won't regrow in the years to come.



We're thankful to Jesus that his "owie" is out and praying for a smooth recovery. We know that his little voice is working...he's picking up where he left off by bossing mom and dad around! Thank you for all your prayers! God is good."

Pastor Cortright is the son of Rev. Charles Cortright, our pastor here at St. Peter in the 1980s. Pastor Ryan Courtright is currently serving at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Madison, WI.

New WELS Outreach Film

The new WELS outreach film *To the Ends of the Earth* will be released Sept. 1.

The film tells the story of the apostle Paul and his work in Philippi. Its title is taken directly from Jesus' command to his disciples at his Ascension: "You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). "Since the movie focuses on mission activity,

it reminds us of the important work that we have as we serve Christ—to reach out with the gospel to the ends of the earth," says Rev. Mike Hintz, retired director of WELS Commission on Evangelism who serves as a consultant for the film.

That's why film resources, including worship materials; adult, small group, teen, and children Bible studies; an Advent by Candlelight program; and personal reflections, will discuss how to witness and share your faith.

One way congregations can use the film and its resources is in connection with WELS Mission and Ministry Sunday, which the Conference of Presidents is encouraging all congregations to observe on Oct. 21. "It's an opportunity to give thanks as we look at the ways we in WELS as congregations and a synod work to reach out with the gospel, but also to look at opportunities that are still around us and how to make the most of them," says Hintz.

By Sept. 1, every congregation will receive a free DVD of the movie for this purpose. Film resources will also be <u>available for download</u> by mid-August. Congregations can <u>bulk order</u> additional copies of the DVD to use as giveaways to congregation members and prospects or for other outreach efforts. Bulk orders must be received by Sept. 7, 2018.
